

#### [Before the palace of Antioch]

GOWER To sing a song that old was sung, From ashes ancient Gower is come; Assuming man's infirmities, To glad your ear, and please your eyes. It hath been sung at festivals, On ember-eves and holy-ales; And lords and ladies in their lives Have read it for restoratives: The purchase is to make men glorious; Et bonum quo antiquius, eo melius. If you, born in these latter times, When wit's more ripe, accept my rhymes. And that to hear an old man sing May to your wishes pleasure bring I life would wish, and that I might Waste it for you, like taper-light. This Antioch, then, Antiochus the Great Built up, this city, for his chiefest seat: The fairest in all Syria, I tell you what mine authors say: This king unto him took a fere, Who died and left a female heir, So buxom, blithe, and full of face, As heaven had lent her all his grace; With whom the father liking took, And her to incest did provoke: Bad child; worse father! To entice his own To evil should be done by none: But custom what they did begin Was with long use account no sin. The beauty of this sinful dame Made many princes thither frame, To seek her as a bed-fellow, In marriage-pleasures play-fellow: Which to prevent he made a law, To keep her still, and men in awe,

That whoso ask'd her for his wife, His riddle told not, lost his life: So for her many a wight did die, As yon grim looks do testify. What now ensues, to the judgement of your eye I give, my cause who best can justify.

# SCENE I Antioch. A room in the palace.

# [Enter ANTIOCHUS, Prince PERICLES, and followers]

ANTIOCHUS Young prince of Tyre, you have at large received The danger of the task you undertake.

*PERICLES* I have, Antiochus, and, with a soul Embolden'd with the glory of her praise, Think death no hazard in this enterprise.

ANTIOCHUS Bring in our daughter, clothed like a bride, For the embracements even of Jove himself; At whose conception, till Lucina reign'd, Nature this dowry gave, to glad her presence, The senate-house of planets all did sit, To knit in her their best perfections.

#### [Music. Enter the Daughter of Antiochus]

*PERICLES* See where she comes, apparell'd like the spring,

Graces her subjects, and her thoughts the king Of every virtue gives renown to men! Her face the book of praises, where is read Nothing but curious pleasures, as from thence

#### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT I

Sorrow were ever razed and testy wrath Could never be her mild companion. You gods that made me man, and sway in love, That have inflamed desire in my breast To taste the fruit of yon celestial tree, Or die in the adventure, be my helps, As I am son and servant to your will, To compass such a boundless happiness!

ANTIOCHUS Prince Pericles,-

PERICLES That would be son to great Antiochus.

ANTIOCHUS Before thee stands this fair Hesperides, With golden fruit, but dangerous to be touch'd; For death-like dragons here affright thee hard: Her face, like heaven, enticeth thee to view Her countless glory, which desert must gain; And which, without desert, because thine eye Presumes to reach, all thy whole heap must die. Yon sometimes famous princes, like thyself, Drawn by report, adventurous by desire, Tell thee, with speechless tongues and semblance pale, That without covering, save yon field of stars, Here they stand martyrs, slain in Cupid's wars; And with dead cheeks advise thee to desist For going on death's net, whom none resist.

PERICLES Antiochus, I thank thee, who hath taught My frail mortality to know itself, And by those fearful objects to prepare This body, like to them, to what I must; For death remember'd should be like a mirror, Who tells us life's but breath, to trust it error. I'll make my will then, and, as sick men do Who know the world, see heaven, but, feeling woe, Gripe not at earthly joys as erst they did; So I bequeath a happy peace to you And all good men, as every prince should do; My riches to the earth from whence they came; But my unspotted fire of love to you.

# [To the Daughter of Antiochus]

Thus ready for the way of life or death, I wait the sharpest blow, Antiochus.

*ANTIOCHUS* Scorning advice, read the conclusion then: Which read and not expounded, 'Tis decreed, As these before thee thou thyself shalt bleed.

DAUGHTER Of all say'd yet, mayst thou prove prosperous! Of all say'd yet, I wish thee happiness!

PERICLES Like a bold champion, I assume the lists,

Nor ask advice of any other thought But faithfulness and courage.

# [He reads the riddle]

I am no viper, yet I feed On mother's flesh which did me breed. I sought a husband, in which labour I found that kindness in a father: He's father, son, and husband mild; I mother, wife, and yet his child. How they may be, and yet in two, As you will live, resolve it you.

Sharp physic is the last: but, O you powers That give heaven countless eyes to view men's acts, Why cloud they not their sights perpetually, If this be true, which makes me pale to read it? Fair glass of light, I loved you, and could still,

# [Takes hold of the hand of the Daughter of Antiochus]

Were not this glorious casket stored with ill: But I must tell you, now my thoughts revolt For he's no man on whom perfections wait That, knowing sin within, will touch the gate. You are a fair viol, and your sense the strings; Who, finger'd to make man his lawful music, Would draw heaven down, and all the gods, to hearken:

But being play'd upon before your time, Hell only danceth at so harsh a chime. Good sooth, I care not for you.

ANTIOCHUS Prince Pericles, touch not, upon thy life. For that's an article within our law, As dangerous as the rest. Your time's expired: Either expound now, or receive your sentence.

#### PERICLES Great king,

Few love to hear the sins they love to act; 'Twould braid yourself too near for me to tell it. Who has a book of all that monarchs do, He's more secure to keep it shut than shown: For vice repeated is like the wandering wind. Blows dust in other's eyes, to spread itself; And yet the end of all is bought thus dear, The breath is gone, and the sore eyes see clear: To stop the air would hurt them. The blind mole casts Copp'd hills towards heaven, to tell the earth is throng'd By man's oppression; and the poor worm doth die for't.

Kings are earth's gods; in vice their law's their will; And if Jove stray, who dares say Jove doth ill?

It is enough you know; and it is fit, What being more known grows worse, to smother it. All love the womb that their first being bred, Then give my tongue like leave to love my head.

ANTIOCHUS [Aside] Heaven, that I had thy head! He has found the meaning: But I will gloze with him.—Young prince of Tyre, Though by the tenor of our strict edict, Your exposition misinterpreting, We might proceed to cancel of your days; Yet hope, succeeding from so fair a tree As your fair self, doth tune us otherwise: Forty days longer we do respite you; If by which time our secret be undone, This mercy shows we'll joy in such a son: And until then your entertain shall be As doth befit our honour and your worth.

# [Exeunt all but PERICLES]

PERICLES How courtesy would seem to cover sin, When what is done is like an hypocrite, The which is good in nothing but in sight! If it be true that I interpret false, Then were it certain you were not so bad As with foul incest to abuse your soul; Where now you're both a father and a son, By your untimely claspings with your child, Which pleasure fits an husband, not a father; And she an eater of her mother's flesh, By the defiling of her parent's bed; And both like serpents are, who though they feed On sweetest flowers, yet they poison breed. Antioch. farewell! For wisdom sees. those men Blush not in actions blacker than the night, Will shun no course to keep them from the light. One sin, I know, another doth provoke; Murder's as near to lust as flame to smoke: Poison and treason are the hands of sin, Ay, and the targets, to put off the shame: Then, lest my lie be cropp'd to keep you clear, By flight I'll shun the danger which I fear.

# [Exit]

[Re-enter ANTIOCHUS]

*ANTIOCHUS* He hath found the meaning, For which we mean to have his head.

He must not live to trumpet forth my infamy, Nor tell the world Antiochus doth sin In such a loathed manner; And therefore instantly this prince must die: For by his fall my honour must keep high. Who attends us there?

# [Enter THALIARD]

THALIARD Doth your highness call?

ANTIOCHUS Thaliard, You are of our chamber, and our mind partakes Her private actions to your secrecy; And for your faithfulness we will advance you. Thaliard, behold, here's poison, and here's gold; We hate the prince of Tyre, and thou must kill him: It fits thee not to ask the reason why, Because we bid it. Say, is it done?

*THALIARD* My lord, 'Tis done.

ANTIOCHUS Enough.

[Enter a Messenger]

Let your breath cool yourself, telling your haste.

MESSENGER My lord, prince Pericles is fled.

[Exit]

ANTIOCHUS As thou Wilt live, fly after: and like an arrow shot From a well-experienced archer hits the mark His eye doth level at, so thou ne'er return Unless thou say "Prince Pericles is dead."

*THALIARD* My lord, If I can get him within my pistol's length, I'll make him sure enough: so, farewell to your highness.

ANTIOCHUS Thaliard, adieu!

[Exit THALIARD]

Till Pericles be dead, My heart can lend no succor to my head.

[Exit]

SCENE II Tyre. A room in the palace. [Enter PERICLES] PERICLES [To Lords without] Let none disturb us.—Why should this change of thoughts, The sad companion, dull-eyed melancholy, Be my so used a guest as not an hour, In the day's glorious walk, or peaceful night, The tomb where grief should sleep, can breed me quiet? Here pleasures court mine eyes, and mine eyes shun them, And danger, which I fear'd, is at Antioch, Whose aim seems far too short to hit me here: Yet neither pleasure's art can joy my spirits, Nor yet the other's distance comfort me. Then it is thus: the passions of the mind, That have their first conception by mis-dread, Have after-nourishment and life by care; And what was first but fear what might be done, Grows elder now and cares it be not done. And so with me: the great Antiochus, 'Gainst whom I am too little to contend, Since he's so great can make his will his act, Will think me speaking, though I swear to silence; Nor boots it me to say I honour him. If he suspect I may dishonour him: And what may make him blush in being known, He'll stop the course by which it might be known; With hostile forces he'll o'erspread the land, And with the ostent of war will look so huge, Amazement shall drive courage from the state; Our men be vanquish'd ere they do resist, And subjects punish'd that ne'er thought offence: Which care of them, not pity of myself, Who am no more but as the tops of trees, Which fence the roots they grow by and defend them, Makes both my body pine and soul to languish, And punish that before that he would punish.	Whereas reproof, obedient and in order, Fits kings, as they are men, for they may err. When Signior Sooth here does proclaim a peace, He flatters you, makes war upon your life. Prince, pardon me, or strike me, if you please; I cannot be much lower than my knees.PERICLESAll leave us else; but let your cares o'erlook What shipping and what lading's in our haven, And then return to us.Image: Image: Imag	
FIRST LORD Joy and all comfort in your sacred breast!	Attend me, then: I went to Antioch, Where as thou know'st, against the face of death,	
SECOND LORD And keep your mind, till you return	I sought the purchase of a glorious beauty. From whence an issue I might propagate,	
to us, Peaceful and comfortable!	Are arms to princes, and bring joys to subjects.	
HELICANUS Peace, peace, and give experience tongue.	Her face was to mine eye beyond all wonder; The rest—hark in thine ear—as black as incest:	

HELICANUS Peace, peace, and give experience tongue. They do abuse the king that flatter him: For flattery is the bellows blows up sin; The thing which is flatter'd, but a spark, To which that blast gives heat and stronger glowing;

'Tis time to fear when tyrants seem to kiss.

Which by my knowledge found, the sinful father Seem'd not to strike, but smooth: but thou

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know'st this,

Such fear so grew in me, I hither fled, Under the covering of a careful night, Who seem'd my good protector; and, being here, Bethought me what was past, what might succeed. I knew him tyrannous; and tyrants' fears Decrease not, but grow faster than the years: And should he doubt it. as no doubt he doth. That I should open to the listening air How many worthy princes' bloods were shed, To keep his bed of blackness unlaid ope, To lop that doubt, he'll fill this land with arms, And make pretence of wrong that I have done him: When all, for mine, if I may call offence. Must feel war's blow, who spares not innocence: Which love to all, of which thyself art one, Who now reprovest me for it,-

HELICANUS Alas, sir!

*PERICLES* Drew sleep out of mine eyes, blood from my cheeks,

Musings into my mind, with thousand doubts How I might stop this tempest ere it came; And finding little comfort to relieve them, I thought it princely charity to grieve them.

*HELICANUS* Well, my lord, since you have given me leave to speak.

Freely will I speak. Antiochus you fear, And justly too, I think, you fear the tyrant, Who either by public war or private treason Will take away your life. Therefore, my lord, go travel for a while, Till that his rage and anger be forgot, Or till the Destinies do cut his thread of life. Your rule direct to any; if to me. Day serves not light more faithful than I'll be.

*PERICLES* I do not doubt thy faith; But should he wrong my liberties in my absence?

HELICANUS We'll mingle our bloods together in the earth, From whence we had our being and our birth.

*PERICLES* Tyre, I now look from thee then, and to Tarsus

Intend my travel, where I'll hear from thee; And by whose letters I'll dispose myself. The care I had and have of subjects' good On thee I lay whose wisdom's strength can bear it. I'll take thy word for faith, not ask thine oath: Who shuns not to break one will sure crack both: But in our orbs we'll live so round and safe, That time of both this truth shall ne'er convince, Thou show'dst a subject's shine, I a true prince.

[Exeunt]

# SCENE III Tyre. An ante-chamber in the palace.

# [Enter THALIARD]

THALIARD So, this is Tyre, and this the court. Here must I kill King Pericles; and if I do it not, I am sure to be hanged at home: 'Tis dangerous. Well, I perceive he was a wise fellow, and had good discretion, that, being bid to ask what he would of the king, desired he might know none of his secrets: now do I see he had some reason for't; for if a king bid a man be a villain, he's bound by the indenture of his oath to be one! Hush! Here come the lords of Tyre.

# [Enter HELICANUS and ESCANES, with other Lords of Tyre]

HELICANUS You shall not need, my fellow peers of Tyre, Further to question me of your king's departure: His seal'd commission, left in trust with me, Doth speak sufficiently he's gone to travel.

THALIARD [Aside] How! The king gone!

HELICANUS If further yet you will be satisfied, Why, as it were unlicensed of your loves, He would depart, I'll give some light unto you. Being at Antioch—

THALIARD [Aside] What from Antioch?

HELICANUS Royal Antiochus—on what cause I know not— Took some displeasure at him; at least he judged so: And doubting lest that he had err'd or sinn'd, To show his sorrow, he'ld correct himself; So puts himself unto the shipman's toil,

With whom each minute threatens life or death.

THALIARD [Aside] Well, I perceive I shall not be hang'd now, although I would; But since he's gone, the king's seas must please: He 's caped the land, to perish at the sea. I'll present myself. Peace to the lords of Tyre!

HELICANUS Lord Thaliard from Antiochus is welcome.

*THALIARD* From him I come With message unto princely Pericles;

But since my landing I have understood Your lord has betook himself to unknown travels, My message must return from whence it came.

HELICANUS We have no reason to desire it, Commended to our master, not to us: Yet, ere you shall depart, this we desire, As friends to Antioch, we may feast in Tyre.

[Exeunt]

SCENE IV Tarsus. A room in the Governor's house.

[Enter CLEON, the governor of Tarsus, with DIONYZA, and others]

*CLEON* My Dionyza, shall we rest us here, And by relating tales of others' griefs, See if 'twill teach us to forget our own?

DIONYZA That were to blow at fire in hope to quench it; For who digs hills because they do aspire Throws down one mountain to cast up a higher. O my distressed lord, even such our griefs are; Here they're but felt, and seen with mischief's eyes, But like to groves, being topp'd, they higher rise.

CLEON O Dionyza,

Who wanteth food, and will not say he wants it, Or can conceal his hunger till he famish? Our tongues and sorrows do sound deep Our woes into the air; our eyes do weep, Till tongues fetch breath that may proclaim them louder;

That, if heaven slumber while their creatures want, They may awake their helps to comfort them. I'll then discourse our woes, felt several years, And wanting breath to speak help me with tears.

DIONYZA I'll do my best, sir.

*CLEON* This Tarsus, o'er which I have the government, A city on whom plenty held full hand, For riches strew'd herself even in the streets; Whose towers bore heads so high they kiss'd the clouds,

And strangers ne'er beheld but wondered at; Whose men and dames so jetted and adorn'd, Like one another's glass to trim them by: Their tables were stored full, to glad the sight, And not so much to feed on as delight; All poverty was scorn'd, and pride so great, The name of help grew odious to repeat. DIONYZA O, 'tis too true.

*CLEON* But see what heaven can do! By this our change, These mouths, who but of late, earth, sea, and air, Were all too little to content and please, Although they gave their creatures in abundance, As houses are defiled for want of use. They are now starved for want of exercise: Those palates who, not yet two summers younger, Must have inventions to delight the taste, Would now be glad of bread, and beg for it: Those mothers who, to nousle up their babes, Thought nought too curious, are ready now To eat those little darlings whom they loved. So sharp are hunger's teeth, that man and wife Draw lots who first shall die to lengthen life: Here stands a lord, and there a lady weeping; Here many sink, yet those which see them fall Have scarce strength left to give them burial. Is not this true?

DIONYZA Our cheeks and hollow eyes do witness it.

*CLEON* O, let those cities that of plenty's cup And her prosperities so largely taste, With their superfluous riots, hear these tears! The misery of Tarsus may be theirs.

[Enter a Lord]

LORD Where's the lord governor?

*CLEON* Here. Speak out thy sorrows which thou bring'st in haste, For comfort is too far for us to expect.

*LORD* We have descried, upon our neighbouring shore, A portly sail of ships make hitherward.

CLEON I thought as much. One sorrow never comes but brings an heir, That may succeed as his inheritor; And so in ours: some neighbouring nation, Taking advantage of our misery, Hath stuff'd these hollow vessels with their power, To beat us down, the which are down already; And make a conquest of unhappy me, Whereas no glory's got to overcome.

*LORD* That's the least fear; for, by the semblance Of their white flags display'd, they bring us peace, And come to us as favourers, not as foes.

*CLEON* Thou speak'st like him's untutor'd to repeat: Who makes the fairest show means most deceit.

But bring they what they will and what they can, What need we fear?

The ground's the lowest, and we are half way there. Go tell their general we attend him here, To know for what he comes, and whence he comes, And what he craves.

LORD I go, my lord.

# [Exit]

*CLEON* Welcome is peace, if he on peace consist; If wars, we are unable to resist.

# [Enter PERICLES with Attendants]

PERICLES Lord governor, for so we hear you are, Let not our ships and number of our men Be like a beacon fired to amaze your eyes. We have heard your miseries as far as Tyre, And seen the desolation of your streets: Nor come we to add sorrow to your tears, But to relieve them of their heavy load; And these our ships, you happily may think Are like the Trojan horse was stuff'd within With bloody veins, expecting overthrow, Are stored with corn to make your needy bread, And give them life whom hunger starved half dead.

ALL The gods of Greece protect you! And we'll pray for you.

*PERICLES* Arise, I pray you, rise: We do not look for reverence, but to love, And harbourage for ourself, our ships, and men.

*CLEON* The which when any shall not gratify, Or pay you with unthankfulness in thought, Be it our wives, our children, or ourselves, The curse of heaven and men succeed their evils! Till when,—the which I hope shall ne'er be seen,— Your grace is welcome to our town and us.

*PERICLES* Which welcome we'll accept; feast here awhile, Until our stars that frown lend us a smile.

[Exeunt]



ACT II

# [Enter GOWER]

GOWER Here have you seen a mighty king His child, I wis, to incest bring; A better prince and benign lord, That will prove awful both in deed and word. Be quiet then as men should be, Till he hath pass'd necessity. I'll show you those in troubles reign, Losing a mite, a mountain gain. The good in conversation, To whom I give my benison, Is still at Tarsus, where each man Thinks all is writ he speken can: And, to remember what he does, Build his statue to make him glorious: But tidings to the contrary Are brought your eyes; what need speak I?

DUMB SHOW.

[Enter at one door PERICLES talking with CLEON; all the train with them. Enter at another door a Gentleman, with a letter to PERICLES; PERICLES shows the letter to CLEON; gives the Messenger a reward, and knights him. Exit PERICLES at one door, and CLEON at another] Good Helicane, that stay'd at home, Not to eat honey like a drone From others' labours; for though he strive To killen bad, keep good alive; And to fulfil his prince' desire, Sends word of all that haps in Tyre: How Thaliard came full bent with sin And had intent to murder him; And that in Tarsus was not best Longer for him to make his rest. He, doing so, put forth to seas, Where when men been, there's seldom ease; For now the wind begins to blow; Thunder above and deeps below Make such unquiet, that the ship Should house him safe is wreck'd and split; And he, good prince, having all lost, By waves from coast to coast is tost: All perishen of man, of pelf, Ne aught escapen but himself; Till fortune, tired with doing bad, Threw him ashore, to give him glad: And here he comes. What shall be next, Pardon old Gower,-this longs the text.

[Exit]

SCENE I Pentapolis. An open place by the sea-side.

# [Enter PERICLES, wet]

PERICLES Yet cease your ire, you angry stars of heaven! Wind, rain, and thunder, remember, earthly man Is but a substance that must yield to you; And I, as fits my nature, do obey you: Alas, the sea hath cast me on the rocks, Wash'd me from shore to shore, and left me breath Nothing to think on but ensuing death: Let it suffice the greatness of your powers To have bereft a prince of all his fortunes; And having thrown him from your watery grave, Here to have death in peace is all he'll crave.

# [Enter three Fishermen]

FIRST FISHERMAN What, ho, Pilch!

SECOND FISHERMAN Ha, come and bring away the nets!

FIRST FISHERMAN What, Patch-breech, I say!

THIRD FISHERMAN What say you, master?

*FIRST FISHERMAN* Look how thou stirrest now! Come away, or I'll fetch thee with a wanion.

THIRD FISHERMAN Faith, master, I am thinking of the poor men that were cast away before us even now.

FIRST FISHERMAN Alas, poor souls, it grieved my heart to hear what pitiful cries they made to us to help them, when, well-a-day, we could scarce help ourselves.

THIRD FISHERMAN Nay, master, said not I as much when I saw the porpus how he bounced and tumbled? They say they're half fish, half flesh: a plague on them, they ne'er come but I look to be washed. Master, I marvel how the fishes live in the sea.

FIRST FISHERMAN Why, as men do a-land; the great ones eat up the little ones: I can compare our rich misers to nothing so fitly as to a whale; a' plays and tumbles, driving the poor fry before him, and at last devours them all at a mouthful: such whales have I heard on o' the land, who never leave gaping till they've swallowed the whole parish, church, steeple, bells, and all.

PERICLES [Aside] A pretty moral.

*THIRD FISHERMAN* But, master, if I had been the sexton, I would have been that day in the belfry.

SECOND FISHERMAN Why, man?

THIRD FISHERMAN Because he should have swallowed me too: and when I had been in his belly, I would have kept such a jangling of the bells, that he should never have left, till he cast bells, steeple, church, and parish up again. But if the good King Simonides were of my mind,—

PERICLES [Aside] Simonides!

*THIRD FISHERMAN* We would purge the land of these drones, that rob the bee of her honey.

*PERICLES [Aside]* How from the finny subject of the sea These fishers tell the infirmities of men;

And from their watery empire recollect All that may men approve or men detect! Peace be at your labour, honest fishermen.

SECOND FISHERMAN Honest! Good fellow, what's that? If it be a day fits you, search out of the calendar, and nobody look after it.

PERICLES May see the sea hath cast upon your coast.

SECOND FISHERMAN What a drunken knave was the sea to cast thee in our way!

[Great shouts within and all cry "The mean knight!"]

SCENE III The same. A hall of state: a banquet prepared.

[Enter SIMONIDES, THAISA, Lords, Attendants, and Knights, from tilting]

SIMONIDES Knights, To say you're welcome were superfluous. To place upon the volume of your deeds, As in a title-page, your worth in arms, Were more than you expect, or more than's fit, Since every worth in show commends itself. Prepare for mirth, for mirth becomes a feast: You are princes and my guests.

*THAISA* But you, my knight and guest; To whom this wreath of victory I give, And crown you king of this day's happiness.

PERICLES 'Tis more by fortune, lady, than by merit.

*SIMONIDES* Call it by what you will, the day is yours; And here, I hope, is none that envies it. In framing an artist, art hath thus decreed, To make some good, but others to exceed; And you are her labour'd scholar. Come, queen o' the feast,—

For, daughter, so you are,—here take your place: Marshal the rest, as they deserve their grace.

KNIGHTS We are honour'd much by good Simonides.

*SIMONIDES* Your presence glads our days: honour we love;

For who hates honour hates the gods above.

MARSHAL Sir, yonder is your place.

PERICLES Some other is more fit.

*FIRST KNIGHT* Contend not, sir; for we are gentlemen That neither in our hearts nor outward eyes Envy the great nor do the low despise.

PERICLES You are right courteous knights.

SIMONIDES Sit, sir, sit.

*PERICLES* By Jove, I wonder, that is king of thoughts, These cates resist me, she but thought upon.

*THAISA* By Juno, that is queen of marriage, All viands that I eat do seem unsavoury. Wishing him my meat. Sure, he's a gallant gentleman.

*SIMONIDES* He's but a country gentleman; Has done no more than other knights have done; Has broken a staff or so; so let it pass.

THAISA To me he seems like diamond to glass.

PERICLES Yon king's to me like to my father's picture, Which tells me in that glory once he was; Had princes sit, like stars, about his throne, And he the sun, for them to reverence; None that beheld him, but, like lesser lights, Did vail their crowns to his supremacy: Where now his son's like a glow-worm in the night, The which hath fire in darkness, none in light: Whereby I see that Time's the king of men, He's both their parent, and he is their grave, And gives them what he will, not what they crave.

SIMONIDES What, are you merry, knights?

KNIGHTS Who can be other in this royal presence?

*SIMONIDES* Here, with a cup that's stored unto the brim,— As you do love, fill to your mistress' lips,— We drink this health to you.

KNIGHTS We thank your grace.

*SIMONIDES* Yet pause awhile: Yon knight doth sit too melancholy, As if the entertainment in our court Had not a show might countervail his worth. Note it not you, Thaisa?

*THAISA* What is it To me, my father?

*SIMONIDES* O, attend, my daughter: Princes in this should live like gods above, Who freely give to every one that comes To honour them: And princes not doing so are like to gnats, Which make a sound, but kill'd are wonder'd at. Therefore to make his entrance more sweet, Here, say we drink this standing-bowl of wine to him.

*THAISA* Alas, my father, it befits not me Unto a stranger knight to be so bold: He may my proffer take for an offence, Since men take women's gifts for impudence.

### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT II

SIMONIDES How! Do as I bid you, or you'll move me else.

*THAISA* [Aside] Now, by the gods, he could not please me better.

*SIMONIDES* And furthermore tell him, we desire to know of him,

Of whence he is, his name and parentage.

THAISA The king my father, sir, has drunk to you.

PERICLES I thank him.

THAISA Wishing it so much blood unto your life.

*PERICLES* I thank both him and you, and pledge him freely.

*THAISA* And further he desires to know of you, Of whence you are, your name and parentage.

*PERICLES* A gentleman of Tyre; my name, Pericles; My education been in arts and arms; Who, looking for adventures in the world, Was by the rough seas reft of ships and men, And after shipwreck driven upon this shore.

*THAISA* He thanks your grace; names himself Pericles, A gentleman of Tyre, Who only by misfortune of the seas Bereft of ships and men, cast on this shore.

SIMONIDES Now, by the gods, I pity his misfortune, And will awake him from his melancholy. Come, gentlemen, we sit too long on trifles, And waste the time, which looks for other revels. Even in your armours, as you are address'd, Will very well become a soldier's dance. I will not have excuse, with saying this Loud music is too harsh for ladies' heads, Since they love men in arms as well as beds.

# [The Knights dance]

So, this was well ask'd, 'twas so well perform'd. Come, sir; Here is a lady that wants breathing too: And I have heard, you knights of Tyre Are excellent in making ladies trip; And that their measures are as excellent.

PERICLES In those that practise them they are, my lord.

*SIMONIDES* O, that's as much as you would be denied Of your fair courtesy.

[The Knights and Ladies dance]

Unclasp, unclasp: Thanks, gentlemen, to all; all have done well.

[To PERICLES]

But you the best. Pages and lights, to conduct These knights unto their several lodgings!

# [To PERICLES]

Yours, sir, We have given order to be next our own.

PERICLES I am at your grace's pleasure.

SIMONIDES Princes, it is too late to talk of love; And that's the mark I know you level at: Therefore each one betake him to his rest; To-morrow all for speeding do their best.

[Exeunt]

# SCENE IV Tyre. A room in the Governor's house.

# [Enter HELICANUS and ESCANES]

HELICANUS No, Escanes, know this of me, Antiochus from incest lived not free: For which, the most high gods not minding longer To withhold the vengeance that they had in store, Due to this heinous capital offence, Even in the height and pride of all his glory, When he was seated in a chariot Of an inestimable value, and his daughter with him, A fire from heaven came and shrivell'd up Their bodies, even to loathing; for they so stunk, That all those eyes adored them ere their fall Scorn now their hand should give them burial.

ESCANES 'Twas very strange.

*HELICANUS* And yet but justice; for though This king were great, his greatness was no guard To bar heaven's shaft, but sin had his reward.

ESCANES 'Tis very true.

# [Enter two or three Lords]

*FIRST LORD* See, not a man in private conference Or council has respect with him but he.

SECOND LORD It shall no longer grieve without reproof.

THIRD LORD And cursed be he that will not second it.

FIRST LORD Follow me, then. Lord Helicane, a word.

*HELICANUS* With me? And welcome: happy day, my lords.

*FIRST LORD* Know that our griefs are risen to the top, And now at length they overflow their banks.

*HELICANUS* Your griefs! For what? Wrong not your prince you love.

FIRST LORD Wrong not yourself, then, noble Helicane; But if the prince do live, let us salute him, Or know what ground's made happy by his breath. If in the world he live, we'll seek him out; If in his grave he rest, we'll find him there; And be resolved he lives to govern us, Or dead, give's cause to mourn his funeral, And leave us to our free election.

*SECOND LORD* Whose death indeed's the strongest in our censure:

And knowing this kingdom is without a head,— Like goodly buildings left without a roof Soon fall to ruin,—your noble self, That best know how to rule and how to reign, We thus submit unto,—our sovereign.

ALL Live, noble Helicane!

HELICANUS For honour's cause, forbear your suffrages: If that you love Prince Pericles, forbear. Take I your wish, I leap into the seas, Where's hourly trouble for a minute's ease. A twelvemonth longer, let me entreat you to Forbear the absence of your king: If in which time expired, he not return, I shall with aged patience bear your yoke. But if I cannot win you to this love, Go search like nobles, like noble subjects, And in your search spend your adventurous worth; Whom if you find, and win unto return, You shall like diamonds sit about his crown.

*FIRST LORD* To wisdom he's a fool that will not yield; And since Lord Helicane enjoineth us, We with our travels will endeavour us.

*HELICANUS* Then you love us, we you, and we'll clasp hands: When peers thus knit, a kingdom ever stands.

[Exeunt]

SCENE V Pentapolis. A room in the palace.

[Enter SIMONIDES, reading a letter, at one door: the Knights meet him]

FIRST KNIGHT Good morrow to the good Simonides.

*siMONIDES* Knights, from my daughter this I let you know, That for this twelvemonth she'll not undertake A married life. Her reason to herself is only known, Which yet from her by no means can I get.

SECOND KNIGHT May we not get access to her, my lord?

*SIMONIDES* 'Faith, by no means; she has so strictly tied Her to her chamber, that 'tis impossible. One twelve moons more she'll wear Diana's livery; This by the eye of Cynthia hath she vow'd And on her virgin honour will not break it.

THIRD KNIGHT Loath to bid farewell, we take our leaves.

[Exeunt Knights]

SIMONIDES SO,

They are well dispatch'd; now to my daughter's letter: She tells me here, she'd wed the stranger knight, Or never more to view nor day nor light. 'Tis well, mistress; your choice agrees with mine; I like that well: nay, how absolute she's in 't, Not minding whether I dislike or no! Well, I do commend her choice; And will no longer have it be delay'd. Soft! Here he comes: I must dissemble it.

# [Enter PERICLES]

PERICLES All fortune to the good Simonides!

*SIMONIDES* To you as much, sir! I am beholding to you For your sweet music this last night: I do Protest my ears were never better fed With such delightful pleasing harmony.

*PERICLES* It is your grace's pleasure to commend; Not my desert.

SIMONIDES Sir, you are music's master.

PERICLES The worst of all her scholars, my good lord.

#### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT II

SIMONIDES Let me ask you one thing: What do you think of my daughter, sir?

PERICLES A most virtuous princess.

SIMONIDES And she is fair too, is she not?

PERICLES As a fair day in summer, wondrous fair.

*SIMONIDES* Sir, my daughter thinks very well of you; Ay, so well, that you must be her master, And she will be your scholar: therefore look to it.

PERICLES I am unworthy for her schoolmaster.

SIMONIDES She thinks not so; peruse this writing else.

PERICLES [Aside] What's here? A letter, that she loves the knight of Tyre! 'Tis the king's subtlety to have my life. O, seek not to entrap me, gracious lord, A stranger and distressed gentleman, That never aim'd so high to love your daughter, But bent all offices to honour her.

*siMONIDES* Thou hast bewitch'd my daughter, and thou art A villain.

*PERICLES* By the gods, I have not: Never did thought of mine levy offence; Nor never did my actions yet commence A deed might gain her love or your displeasure.

SIMONIDES Traitor, thou liest.

PERICLES Traitor!

SIMONIDES Ay, traitor.

*PERICLES* Even in his throat—unless it be the king— That calls me traitor, I return the lie.

*SIMONIDES* [Aside] Now, by the gods, I do applaud his courage.

*PERICLES* My actions are as noble as my thoughts, That never relish'd of a base descent. I came unto your court for honour's cause, And not to be a rebel to her state; And he that otherwise accounts of me, This sword shall prove he's honour's enemy. *SIMONIDES* No? Here comes my daughter, she can witness it.

[Enter THAISA]

*PERICLES* Then, as you are as virtuous as fair, Resolve your angry father, if my tongue Did ere solicit, or my hand subscribe To any syllable that made love to you.

*THAISA* Why, sir, say if you had, Who takes offence at that would make me glad?

SIMONIDES Yea, mistress, are you so peremptory?

#### [Aside]

I am glad on 't with all my heart.— I'll tame you; I'll bring you in subjection. Will you, not having my consent, Bestow your love and your affections Upon a stranger?

# [Aside]

who, for aught I know, May be, nor can I think the contrary, As great in blood as I myself.— Therefore hear you, mistress; either frame Your will to mine,—and you, sir, hear you, Either be ruled by me, or I will make you— Man and wife: Nay, come, your hands and lips must seal it too: And being join'd, I'll thus your hopes destroy; And for a further grief,—God give you joy!— What, are you both pleased?

THAISA Yes, if you love me, sir.

PERICLES Even as my life, or blood that fosters it.

SIMONIDES What, are you both agreed?

BOTH Yes, if it please your majesty.

*siMONIDES* It pleaseth me so well, that I will see you wed; And then with what haste you can get you to bed.

[Exeunt]

# ACT III

# [Enter GOWER]

GOWER Now sleep yslaked hath the rout; No din but snores the house about, Made louder by the o'er-fed breast Of this most pompous marriage-feast. The cat, with eyne of burning coal, Now crouches fore the mouse's hole; And crickets sing at the oven's mouth, E'er the blither for their drouth. Hymen hath brought the bride to bed. Where, by the loss of maidenhead, A babe is moulded. Be attent, And time that is so briefly spent With your fine fancies quaintly eche: What's dumb in show I'll plain with speech.

#### DUMB SHOW.

[Enter, PERICLES and SIMONIDES at one door, with Attendants; a Messenger meets them, kneels, and gives PERICLES a letter: PERICLES shows it SIMONIDES; the Lords kneel to him. Then enter THAISA with child, with LYCHORIDA a nurse. The King shows her the letter; she rejoices: she and PERICLES take leave of her father, and depart with LYCHORIDA and their Attendants. Then exeunt SIMONIDES and the rest]

# [Enter PERICLES, on shipboard]

CERIMON Set 't down, let's look up on't. SECOND GENTLEMAN 'Tis like a coffin. sir. CERIMON Whate'er it be. 'Tis wondrous heavy. Wrench it open straight: If the sea's stomach be o'ercharged with gold, Tis a good constraint of fortune it belches upon us. SECOND GENTLEMAN 'Tis so, my lord. CERIMON How close 'Tis caulk'd and bitumed! Did the sea cast it up? FIRST SERVANT I never saw so huge a billow, sir, As toss'd it upon shore. CERIMON Wrench it open; Soft! It smells most sweetly in my sense. SECOND GENTLEMAN A delicate odour. CERIMON As ever hit my nostril. So, up with it. O you most potent gods! What's here? A corse! FIRST GENTLEMAN Most strange!

*CERIMON* Shrouded in cloth of state; balm'd and entreasured With full bags of spices! A passport too! Apollo, perfect me in the characters!

[Reads from a scroll]

"Here I give to understand, If e'er this coffin drive a-land, I, King Pericles, have lost This queen, worth all our mundane cost. Who finds her, give her burying; She was the daughter of a king: Besides this treasure for a fee, The gods requite his charity!"

If thou livest, Pericles, thou hast a heart That even cracks for woe! This chanced to-night.

#### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT III

SECOND GENTLEMAN Most likely, sir.

*CERIMON* Nay, certainly to-night; For look how fresh she looks! They were too rough That threw her in the sea. Make a fire within: Fetch hither all my boxes in my closet.

#### [Exit a Servant]

Death may usurp on nature many hours, And yet the fire of life kindle again The o'erpress'd spirits. I heard of an Egyptian That had nine hours lien dead, Who was by good appliance recovered.

### [Re-enter a Servant, with boxes, napkins, and fire]

Well said, well said; the fire and cloths. The rough and woeful music that we have, Cause it to sound, beseech you. The viol once more: how thou stirr'st, thou block! The music there!—I pray you, give her air. Gentlemen.

This queen will live: nature awakes; a warmth Breathes out of her: she hath not been entranced Above five hours: see how she gins to blow Into life's flower again!

*FIRST GENTLEMAN* The heavens, Through you, increase our wonder and set up Your fame forever.

CERIMON She is alive; behold, Her eyelids, cases to those heavenly jewels Which Pericles hath lost, Begin to part their fringes of bright gold; The diamonds of a most praised water Do appear, to make the world twice rich. Live, And make us weep to hear your fate, fair creature, Rare as you seem to be.

### [She moves]

*THAISA* O dear Diana, Where am I? Where's my lord? What world is this?

SECOND GENTLEMAN Is not this strange?

FIRST GENTLEMAN Most rare.

*CERIMON* Hush, my gentle neighbours! Lend me your hands; to the next chamber bear her. Get linen: now this matter must be look'd to, For her relapse is mortal. Come, come; And Æsculapius guide us!

[Exeunt, carrying her away]

SCENE III Tarsus. A room in CLEON's house.

# [Enter PERICLES, CLEON, DIONYZA, and LYCHORIDA with MARINA in her arms]

*PERICLES* Most honour'd Cleon, I must needs be gone; My twelve months are expired, and Tyrus stands In a litigious peace. You, and your lady, Take from my heart all thankfulness! The gods Make up the rest upon you!

*CLEON* Your shafts of fortune, though they hurt you mortally, Yet glance full wanderingly on us.

DIONYZA O your sweet queen! That the strict fates had pleased you had brought her hither, To have bless'd mine eyes with her!

*PERICLES* We cannot but obey The powers above us. Could I rage and roar As doth the sea she lies in, yet the end Must be as 'tis. My gentle babe Marina, whom, For she was born at sea, I have named so, here I charge your charity withal, leaving her The infant of your care; beseeching you To give her princely training, that she may be Manner'd as she is born.

*CLEON* Fear not, my lord, but think Your grace, that fed my country with your corn, For which the people's prayers still fall upon you, Must in your child be thought on. If neglection Should therein make me vile, the common body, By you relieved, would force me to my duty: But if to that my nature need a spur, The gods revenge it upon me and mine, To the end of generation!

#### PERICLES I believe you;

Your honour and your goodness teach me to 't, Without your vows. Till she be married, madam, By bright Diana, whom we honour, all Unscissor'd shall this hair of mine remain, Though I show ill in 't. So I take my leave. Good madam, make me blessed in your care In bringing up my child.

*DIONYZA* I have one myself, Who shall not be more dear to my respect Than yours, my lord.

PERICLES Madam, my thanks and prayers.

#### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT IV

*CLEON* We'll bring your grace e'en to the edge o' the shore, Then give you up to the mask'd Neptune and The gentlest winds of heaven.

PERICLES I will embrace Your offer. Come, dearest madam. O, no tears, Lychorida, no tears: Look to your little mistress, on whose grace You may depend hereafter. Come, my lord.

[Exeunt]

SCENE IV Ephesus. A room in CERIMON's house.

# [Enter CERIMON and THAISA]

*CERIMON* Madam, this letter, and some certain jewels, Lay with you in your coffer: which are now At your command. Know you the character? THAISA It is my lord's . That I was shipp'd at sea, I well remember, Even on my eaning time; but whether there Deliver'd, by the holy gods, I cannot rightly say. But since King Pericles, My wedded lord, I ne'er shall see again, A vestal livery will I take me to, And never more have joy.

*CERIMON* Madam, if this you purpose as ye speak, Diana's temple is not distant far, Where you may abide till your date expire. Moreover, if you please, a niece of mine Shall there attend you.

*THAISA* My recompense is thanks, that's all; Yet my good will is great, though the gift small.

[Exeunt]



# ACT IV

### [Enter GOWER]

Imagine Pericles arrived at Tyre, GOWER Welcomed and settled to his own desire. His woeful queen we leave at Ephesus, Unto Diana there a votaress. Now to Marina bend your mind, Whom our fast-growing scene must find At Tarsus, and by Cleon train'd In music, letters; who hath gain'd Of education all the grace, Which makes her both the heart and place Of general wonder. But, alack, That monster envy, oft the wrack Of earned praise, Marina's life Seeks to take off by treason's knife. And in this kind hath our Cleon One daughter, and a wench full grown, Even ripe for marriage-rite; this maid Hight Philoten: and it is said For certain in our story, she Would ever with Marina be: Be't when she weaved the sleided silk With fingers long, small, white as milk; Or when she would with sharp needle wound The cambric, which she made more sound By hurting it; or when to the lute She sung, and made the night-bird mute,

That still records with moan: or when She would with rich and constant pen Vail to her mistress Dian; still This Philoten contends in skill With absolute Marina: so With the dove of Paphos might the crow Vie feathers white. Marina gets All praises, which are paid as debts, And not as given. This so darks In Philoten all graceful marks, That Cleon's wife, with envy rare, A present murderer does prepare For good Marina, that her daughter Might stand peerless by this slaughter. The sooner her vile thoughts to stead, Lychorida, our nurse, is dead: And cursed Dionyza hath The pregnant instrument of wrath Prest for this blow. *BOULT* 'Faith, some do, and some do not. But, mistress, if I have bargained for the joint,—

BAWD Thou mayst cut a morsel off the spit.

BOULT I may so.

*BAWD* Who should deny it? Come, young one, I like the manner of your garments well.

BOULT Ay, by my faith, they shall not be changed yet.

*BAWD* Boult, spend thou that in the town: report what a sojourner we have; you'll lose nothing by custom. When nature flamed this piece, she meant thee a good turn; therefore say what a paragon she is, and thou hast the harvest out of thine own report.

*BOULT* I warrant you, mistress, thunder shall not so awake the beds of eels as my giving out her beauty stir up the lewdly-inclined. I'll bring home some to-night.

BAWD Come your ways; follow me.

MARINA If fires be hot, knives sharp, or waters deep, Untied I still my virgin knot will keep. Diana, aid my purpose!

BAWD What have we to do with Diana? Pray you, will you go with us?

[Exeunt]

### SCENE III Tarsus. A room in CLEON's house.

[Enter CLEON and DIONYZA]

DIONYZA Why, are you foolish? Can it be undone?

*CLEON* O Dionyza, such a piece of slaughter The sun and moon ne'er look'd upon!

*DIONYZA* I think You'll turn a child again.

*CLEON* Were I chief lord of all this spacious world, I'ld give it to undo the deed. O lady, Much less in blood than virtue, yet a princess To equal any single crown o' the earth I' the justice of compare! O villain Leonine! Whom thou hast poison'd too: If thou hadst drunk to him, 't had been a kindness Becoming well thy fact: what canst thou say When noble Pericles shall demand his child?

DIONYZA That she is dead. Nurses are not the fates, To foster it, nor ever to preserve. She died at night; I'll say so. Who can cross it? Unless you play the pious innocent, And for an honest attribute cry out "She died by foul play."

*CLEON* O, go to. Well, well, Of all the faults beneath the heavens, the gods Do like this worst.

DIONYZA Be one of those that think The petty wrens of Tarsus will fly hence, And open this to Pericles. I do shame To think of what a noble strain you are, And of how coward a spirit.

*CLEON* To such proceeding Who ever but his approbation added, Though not his prime consent, he did not flow From honourable sources.

DIONYZA Be it so, then: Yet none does know, but you, how she came dead, Nor none can know, Leonine being gone. She did distain my child, and stood between Her and her fortunes: none would look on her, But cast their gazes on Marina's face; Whilst ours was blurted at and held a malkin Not worth the time of day. It pierced me through; And though you call my course unnatural, You not your child well loving, yet I find It greets me as an enterprise of kindness Perform'd to your sole daughter.

# [Enter GOWER, before the monument of MARINA at Tarsus]

By you being pardon'd, we commit no crime To use one language in each several clime Where our scenes seem to live. I do beseech vou To learn of me, who stand i' the gaps to teach you, The stages of our story. Pericles Is now again thwarting the wayward seas, Attended on by many a lord and knight. To see his daughter, all his life's delight. Old Escanes, whom Helicanus late Advanced in time to great and high estate, Is left to govern. Bear you it in mind, Old Helicanus goes along behind. Well-sailing ships and bounteous winds have brought This king to Tarsus,-think his pilot thought; So with his steerage shall your thoughts grow on,-To fetch his daughter home, who first is gone. Like motes and shadows see them move awhile; Your ears unto your eyes I'll reconcile.

#### DUMB SHOW.

[Enter PERICLES, at one door, with all his train; CLEON and DIONYZA, at the other. CLEON shows PERICLES the tomb; whereat PERICLES

See how belief may suffer by foul show! This borrow'd passion stands for true old woe; And Pericles, in sorrow all devour'd, With sighs shot through, and biggest tears o'ershower'd.

Leaves Tarsus and again embarks. He swears Never to wash his face, nor cut his hairs: He puts on sackcloth, and to sea. He bears A tempest, which his mortal vessel tears, And yet he rides it out. Now please you wit. The epitaph is for Marina writ By wicked Dionyza.

#### [Reads the inscription on MARINA's monument]

"The fairest, sweet'st, and best lies here, Who wither'd in her spring of year. She was of Tyrus the king's daughter, On whom foul death hath made this slaughter; Marina was she call'd; and at her birth, Thetis, being proud, swallow'd some part o' the earth:

Therefore the earth, fearing to be o'erflow'd, Hath Thetis' birth-child on the heavens bestow'd: Wherefore she does, and swears she'll never stint, Make raging battery upon shores of flint."

No visor does become black villany So well as soft and tender flattery. Let Pericles believe his daughter's dead, And bear his courses to be ordered By Lady Fortune; while our scene must play His daughter's woe and heavy well-a-day In her unholy service. Patience, then, And think you now are all in Mytilene.

#### SCENE V

Mytilene. A street before the brothel.

### [Enter, from the brothel, two Gentlemen]

*MARINA* Do you know this house to be a place of such resort, and will come into 't? I hear say you are of honourable parts, and are the governor of this place.

*LYSIMACHUS* Why, hath your principal made known unto you who I am?

MARINA Who is my principal?

*LYSIMACHUS* Why, your herb-woman; she that sets seeds and roots of shame and iniquity. O, you have heard something of my power, and so stand aloof for more serious wooing. But I protest to thee, pretty one, my authority shall not see thee, or else look friendly upon thee. Come, bring me to some private place: come, come.

*MARINA* If you were born to honour, show it now; If put upon you, make the judgement good That thought you worthy of it.

*LYSIMACHUS* How's this? How's this? Some more; be sage.

#### MARINA For me,

That am a maid, though most ungentle fortune Have placed me in this sty, where, since I came, Diseases have been sold dearer than physic, O, that the gods

Would set me free from this unhallow'd place, Though they did change me to the meanest bird That flies i' the purer air!

*LYSIMACHUS* I did not think Thou couldst have spoke so well; ne'er dream'd thou couldst. Had I brought hither a corrupted mind, Thy speech had alter'd it. Hold, here's gold for thee: Persever in that clear way thou goest, And the gods strengthen thee!

MARINA The good gods preserve you!

LYSIMACHUS For me, be you thoughten That I came with no ill intent; for to me The very doors and windows savour vilely. Fare thee well. Thou art a piece of virtue, and I doubt not but thy training hath been noble. Hold, here's more gold for thee. A curse upon him, die he like a thief, That robs thee of thy goodness! If thou dost Hear from me, it shall be for thy good.

# [Re-enter BOULT]

BOULT I beseech your honour, one piece for me.

*LYSIMACHUS* Avaunt, thou damned door-keeper! Your house, but for this virgin that doth prop it, Would sink and overwhelm you. Away!

[Exit]

*BOULT* How's this? We must take another course with you. If your peevish chastity, which is not worth a breakfast in the cheapest country under the cope, shall undo a whole household, let me be gelded like a spaniel. Come your ways.

MARINA Whither would you have me?

*BOULT* I must have your maidenhead taken off, or the common hangman shall execute it. Come your ways. We'll have no more gentlemen driven away. Come your ways, I say.

[Re-enter BAWD]

BAWD How now! What's the matter?

*BOULT* Worse and worse, mistress; she has here spoken holy words to the Lord Lysimachus.

BAWD O abominable!

*BOULT* She makes our profession as it were to stink afore the face of the gods.

BAWD Marry, hang her up for ever!

*BOULT* The nobleman would have dealt with her like a nobleman, and she sent him away as cold as a snowball; saying his prayers too.

*BAWD* Boult, take her away; use her at thy pleasure: crack the glass of her virginity, and make the rest malleable.

#### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT V

*BOULT* An if she were a thornier piece of ground than she is, she shall be ploughed.

MARINA Hark, hark, you gods!

*BAWD* She conjures: away with her! Would she had never come within my doors! Marry, hang you! She's born to undo us. Will you not go the way of women-kind? Marry, come up, my dish of chastity with rosemary and bays!

[Exit]

BOULT Come, mistress; come your ways with me.

MARINA Whither wilt thou have me?

BOULT To take from you the jewel you hold so dear.

MARINA Prithee, tell me one thing first.

BOULT Come now, your one thing.

MARINA What canst thou wish thine enemy to be?

*BOULT* Why, I could wish him to be my master, or rather, my mistress.

MARINA Neither of these are so bad as thou art, Since they do better thee in their command. Thou hold'st a place, for which the pained's t fiend Of hell would not in reputation change: Thou art the damned doorkeeper to every Coistrel that comes inquiring for his Tib; To the choleric fisting of every rogue Thy ear is liable; thy food is such As hath been belch'd on by infected lungs.

*BOULT* What would you have me do? Go to the wars, would you? Where a man may serve seven years for the

loss of a leg, and have not money enough in the end to buy him a wooden one?

MARINA Do any thing but this thou doest. Empty Old receptacles, or common shores, of filth; Serve by indenture to the common hangman: Any of these ways are yet better than this; For what thou professest, a baboon, could he speak, Would own a name too dear. O, that the gods Would safely deliver me from this place! Here, here's gold for thee. If that thy master would gain by thee, Proclaim that I can sing, weave, sew, and dance, With other virtues, which I'll keep from boast: And I will undertake all these to teach. I doubt not but this populous city will Yield many scholars.

BOULT But can you teach all this you speak of?

*MARINA* Prove that I cannot, take me home again, And prostitute me to the basest groom That doth frequent your house.

*BOULT* Well, I will see what I can do for thee: if I can place thee, I will.

MARINA But amongst honest women.

*BOULT* 'Faith, my acquaintance lies little amongst them. But since my master and mistress have bought you, there's no going but by their consent: therefore I will make them acquainted with your purpose, and I doubt not but I shall find them tractable enough. Come, I'll do for thee what I can; come your ways.

[Exeunt]

# ACT V

# [Enter GOWER]

GOWER Marina thus the brothel 'scapes, and chances Into an honest house, our story says. She sings like one immortal, and she dances As goddess-like to her admired lays; Deep clerks she dumbs; and with her needle composes Nature's own shape, of bud, bird, branch, or berry, That even her art sisters the natural roses; Her inkle, silk, twin with the rubied cherry: That pupils lacks she none of noble race, Who pour their bounty on her; and her gain She gives the cursed bawd. Here we her place; And to her father turn our thoughts again, Where we left him, on the sea. We there him lost; Whence, driven before the winds, he is arrived Here where his daughter dwells; and on this coast Suppose him now at anchor. The city strived God Neptune's annual feast to keep: from whence Lysimachus our Tyrian ship espies, His banners sable, trimm'd with rich expense; And to him in his barge with fervor hies.

#### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT V

In your supposing once more put your sight Of heavy Pericles; think this his bark: Where what is done in action, more, if might, Shall be discover'd; please you, sit and hark.

[Exit]

#### SCENE I

On board PERICLES' ship, off Mytilene. A close pavilion on deck, with a curtain before it; PERICLES within it, reclined on a couch. A barge lying beside the Tyrian vessel.

[Enter two Sailors, one belonging to the Tyrian vessel, the other to the barge; to them HELICANUS]

*TYRIAN SAILOR* [*To the Sailor of Mytilene*] Where is lord Helicanus? He can resolve you. O, here he is. Sir, there's a barge put off from Mytilene, And in it is Lysimachus the governor, Who craves to come aboard. What is your will?

HELICANUS That he have his. Call up some gentlemen.

TYRIAN SAILOR Ho, gentlemen! My lord calls.

[Enter two or three Gentlemen]

FIRST GENTLEMAN Doth your lordship call?

*HELICANUS* Gentlemen, there's some of worth would come aboard; I pray ye, greet them fairly.

[The Gentlemen and the two Sailors descend, and go on board the barge]

[Enter, from thence, LYSIMACHUS and Lords; with the Gentlemen and the two Sailors]

*TYRIAN SAILOR* Sir, This is the man that can, in aught you would, Resolve you.

LYSIMACHUS Hail, reverend sir! The gods preserve you!

*HELICANUS* And you, sir, to outlive the age I am, And die as I would do.

*LYSIMACHUS* You wish me well. Being on shore, honouring of Neptune's triumphs, Seeing this goodly vessel ride before us, I made to it, to know of whence you are. HELICANUS First, what is your place?

*LYSIMACHUS* I am the governor of this place you lie before.

HELICANUS Sir,

Our vessel is of Tyre, in it the king; A man who for this three months hath not spoken To any one, nor taken sustenance But to prorogue his grief.

LYSIMACHUS Upon what ground is his distemperature?

*HELICANUS* 'Twould be too tedious to repeat; But the main grief springs from the loss Of a beloved daughter and a wife.

LYSIMACHUS May we not see him?

*HELICANUS* You may; But bootless is your sight: he will not speak To any.

LYSIMACHUS Yet let me obtain my wish.

HELICANUS Behold him.

# [PERICLES discovered]

This was a goodly person, Till the disaster that, one mortal night, Drove him to this.

*LYSIMACHUS* Sir king, all hail! The gods preserve you! Hail, royal sir!

HELICANUS It is in vain; he will not speak to you.

*FIRST LORD* Sir, We have a maid in Mytilene, I durst wager, Would win some words of him.

LYSIMACHUS 'Tis well bethought. She questionless with her sweet harmony And other chosen attractions, would allure, And make a battery through his deafen'd parts, Which now are midway stopp'd: She is all happy as the fairest of all, And, with her fellow maids is now upon The leafy shelter that abuts against The island's side.

[Whispers a Lord, who goes off in the barge of LYSIMACHUS]

*HELICANUS* Sure, all's effectless; yet nothing we'll omit That bears recovery's name. But, since your kindness We have stretch'd thus far, let us beseech you

*PERICLES* Now, blessing on thee! Rise; thou art my child.

Give me fresh garments. Mine own, Helicanus; She is not dead at Tarsus, as she should have been, By savage Cleon: she shall tell thee all; When thou shalt kneel, and justify in knowledge She is thy very princess. Who is this?

*HELICANUS* Sir, 'tis the governor of Mytilene, Who, hearing of your melancholy state, Did come to see you.

#### PERICLES I embrace you.

Give me my robes. I am wild in my beholding. O heavens bless my girl! But, hark, what music? Tell Helicanus, my Marina, tell him O'er, point by point, for yet he seems to doubt, How sure you are my daughter. But, what music?

HELICANUS My lord, I hear none.

PERICLES None! The music of the spheres! List, my Marina.

LYSIMACHUS It is not good to cross him; give him way.

PERICLES Rarest sounds! Do ye not hear?

LYSIMACHUS My lord, I hear.

[Music]

*PERICLES* Most heavenly music! It nips me unto listening, and thick slumber Hangs upon mine eyes: let me rest.

# [Sleeps]

*LYSIMACHUS* A pillow for his head: So, leave him all. Well, my companion friends, If this but answer to my just belief, I'll well remember you.

# [Exeunt all but PERICLES]

# [DIANA appears to PERICLES as in a vision]

DIANA My temple stands in Ephesus: hie thee thither, And do upon mine altar sacrifice. There, when my maiden priests are met together, Before the people all, Reveal how thou at sea didst lose thy wife: To mourn thy crosses, with thy daughter's, call And give them repetition to the life. Or perform my bidding, or thou livest in woe; Do it, and happy; by my silver bow! Awake, and tell thy dream.

# [Disappears]

*PERICLES* Celestial Dian, goddess argentine, I will obey thee. Helicanus!

# [Re-enter HELICANUS, LYSIMACHUS, and MARINA]

### HELICANUS Sir?

*PERICLES* My purpose was for Tarsus, there to strike The inhospitable Cleon; but I am For other service first: toward Ephesus Turn our blown sails; eftsoons I'll tell thee why.

# [To LYSIMACHUS]

Shall we refresh us, sir, upon your shore, And give you gold for such provision As our intents will need?

*LYSIMACHUS* Sir, With all my heart; and, when you come ashore, I have another suit.

*PERICLES* You shall prevail, Were it to woo my daughter; for it seems You have been noble towards her.

LYSIMACHUS Sir, lend me your arm.

PERICLES Come, my Marina.

[Exeunt]

# SCENE II

# [Enter GOWER, before the temple of DIANA at Ephesus]

GOWER Now our sands are almost run; More a little, and then dumb. This, my last boon, give me, For such kindness must relieve me, That you aptly will suppose What pageantry, what feats, what shows, What minstrelsy, and pretty din, The regent made in Mytilene To greet the king. So he thrived, That he is promised to be wived To fair Marina; but in no wise Till he had done his sacrifice, As Dian bade: whereto being bound, The interim, pray you, all confound. In feather'd briefness sails are fill'd, And wishes fall out as they're will'd. At Ephesus, the temple see, Our king and all his company. That he can hither come so soon, Is by your fancy's thankful doom.

### [Exit]

### SCENE III

The temple of DIANA at Ephesus; THAISA standing near the altar, as high priestess; a number of Virgins on each side; CERIMON and other Inhabitants of Ephesus attending.

# [Enter PERICLES, with his train; LYSIMACHUS, HELICANUS, MARINA, and a Lady]

PERICLES Hail, Dian! To perform thy just command, I here confess myself the king of Tyre; Who, frighted from my country, did wed At Pentapolis the fair Thaisa. At sea in childbed died she, but brought forth A maid-child call'd Marina; who, O goddess, Wears yet thy silver livery. She at Tarsus Was nursed with Cleon; who at fourteen years He sought to murder: but her better stars Brought her to Mytilene; 'gainst whose shore Riding, her fortunes brought the maid aboard us, Where, by her own most clear remembrance, she Made known herself my daughter.

*THAISA* Voice and favour! You are, you are—O royal Pericles!

### [Faints]

*PERICLES* What means the nun? She dies! Help, gentlemen!

*CERIMON* Noble sir, If you have told Diana's altar true, This is your wife.

*PERICLES* Reverend appearer, no; I threw her overboard with these very arms.

CERIMON Upon this coast, I warrant you.

PERICLES 'Tis most certain.

*CERIMON* Look to the lady; O, she's but o'erjoy'd. Early in blustering morn this lady was Thrown upon this shore. I oped the coffin, Found there rich jewels; recover'd her, and placed her Here in Diana's temple.

PERICLES May we see them?

*CERIMON* Great sir, they shall be brought you to my house, Whither I invite you. Look, Thaisa is recovered.

*THAISA* O, let me look! If he be none of mine, my sanctity Will to my sense bend no licentious ear, But curb it, spite of seeing. O, my lord, Are you not Pericles? Like him you spake, Like him you are: did you not name a tempest, A birth, and death?

PERICLES The voice of dead Thaisa!

*THAISA* That Thaisa am I, supposed dead And drown'd.

PERICLES Immortal Dian!

*THAISA* Now I know you better. When we with tears parted Pentapolis, The king my father gave you such a ring.

[Shows a ring]

*PERICLES* This, this: no more, you gods! Your present kindness

#### Pericles, Prince Of Tyre: ACT V

Makes my past miseries sports: you shall do well, That on the touching of her lips I may Melt and no more be seen. O, come, be buried A second time within these arms.

MARINA My heart Leaps to be gone into my mother's bosom.

# [Kneels to THAISA]

*PERICLES* Look, who kneels here! Flesh of thy flesh, Thaisa; Thy burden at the sea, and call'd Marina For she was yielded there.

THAISA Blest, and mine own!

HELICANUS Hail, madam, and my queen!

THAISA I know you not.

PERICLES You have heard me say, when I did fly from Tyre, I left behind an ancient substitute: Can you remember what I call'd the man? I have named him oft.

THAISA 'Twas Helicanus then.

PERICLES Still confirmation: Embrace him, dear Thaisa; this is he. Now do I long to hear how you were found; How possibly preserved; and who to thank, Besides the gods, for this great miracle.

*THAISA* Lord Cerimon, my lord; this man, Through whom the gods have shown their power; that can From first to last resolve you.

*PERICLES* Reverend sir, The gods can have no mortal officer More like a god than you. Will you deliver How this dead queen re-lives?

*CERIMON* I will, my lord. Beseech you, first go with me to my house, Where shall be shown you all was found with her; How she came placed here in the temple; No needful thing omitted.

PERICLES Pure Dian, bless thee for thy vision! I Will offer night-oblations to thee. Thaisa, This prince, the fair-betrothed of your daughter, Shall marry her at Pentapolis. And now, This ornament Makes me look dismal will I clip to form; And what this fourteen years no razor touch'd, To grace thy marriage-day, I'll beautify.

*THAISA* Lord Cerimon hath letters of good credit, sir, My father's dead.

PERICLES Heavens make a star of him! Yet there, my queen, We'll celebrate their nuptials, and ourselves Will in that kingdom spend our following days: Our son and daughter shall in Tyrus reign. Lord Cerimon, we do our longing stay To hear the rest untold: sir, lead's the way.

# [Exeunt]

# [Enter GOWER]

GOWER In Antiochus and his daughter you have heard Of monstrous lust the due and just reward: In Pericles, his queen and daughter, seen, Although assail'd with fortune fierce and keen, Virtue preserved from fell destruction's blast, Led on by heaven, and crown'd with joy at last: In Helicanus may you well descry A figure of truth, of faith, of loyalty: In reverend Cerimon there well appears The worth that learned charity aye wears: For wicked Cleon and his wife, when fame Had spread their cursed deed, and honour'd name Of Pericles, to rage the city turn, That him and his they in his palace burn; The gods for murder seemed so content To punish them; although not done, but meant. So, on your patience evermore attending, New joy wait on you! Here our play has ending.
